Hidden Histories heritage project secures National Lottery support

Four Corners is delighted to announce an ambitious new project which has received a grant of £250,000 from The National Lottery Heritage Fund*.

Thanks to National Lottery players, **Hidden Histories** will develop Four Corners Archive as an active site for community-engaged practice, research and public programmes that explore radical and untold social histories.

Four Corners Archive comprises the film and photographic heritage of Four Corners, Half Moon Photography Workshop and *Camerawork* magazine, 1972 to 1987. The collection and online archive offer a rich source of material on working lives, protest, feminism and underrepresented communities.

Carla Mitchell, Artistic Development Director at Four Corners said: “This timely project meets a growing interest in radical histories from below. The UK community-arts movements of the 1970s and 1980s are being rediscovered by a new generation engaging with today’s social and political issues. There is a renewed focus on socially-engaged film and photography, which draws inspiration from grassroots histories such as those in Four Corners Archive. We aim to create a living archive which explores alternative and untold histories through a collaborative approach.”

Stuart McLeod, Director London & South at The National Lottery Heritage Fund, said: “Thanks to money raised by National Lottery players, we’re pleased to support this project which will explore and share untold histories and unheard voices with new audiences.”

On the Move: the history of the Half Moon Photography

Workshop/Camerawork touring exhibitions, 1976-1984

The Half Moon Photography Workshop (later Camerawork) played a radical role in reshaping the photographic landscape of Britain. From 1976 they created laminated

touring exhibitions which travelled to venues across the country. There were over 50 of these affordable, portable exhibitions, which toured to art centres and universities, prisons, churches and laundrettes.
